Report of the OHCHR on Biennial panel discussion on youth and human rights: *Young people's engagement with climate change and global environmental decision-making processes* VIVAT International, on behalf of this NGO coalition, welcomes this Report of the OHCHR on the biennial panel on young people's engagement with climate change and global environmental decision-making processes.

The High Commissioner highlighted that decades of youth activism have provided the momentum for many of the advances made in protecting the planet.¹ Young people have been at the forefront of the recognition of the right to a clean, healthy and sustainable environment.

However, youth continue to face barriers to the effective, active and meaningful exercise of their right to participate in decision-making processes. Such barriers are multiplied for young people with intersecting forms of discrimination and in situation of vulnerability.²

We note, even when youth formal participation is ensured, its influence in the decision-making processes, is very limited. This generates mistrust in political institutions and local authorities and diminishes motivation and engagement among youth. Substantial and transformative participation remains critical.

To foster this **at the national, regional and international levels, t**his coalition calls on the Member States to:

- Ensure effective and transformative participation of youth in decision-making processes.
- Promote systematic mainstreaming of youth rights through existing UN Human Rights mechanisms, especially the UPR and the Treaty Bodies.
- Establish a mandate for a Special Procedure on youth rights.
